Statement outlining results, risks and significant changes in operations, personnel and programs

Introduction

The National Battlefields Commission Mandate (the Commission)

The Commission was established in 1908 under the *Act respecting the National Battlefields in Quebec*. The Commission is a departmental corporation named in Schedule II of the *Financial Administration Act*.

The Commission's mandate is to ensure that all the cultural, recreational and natural resources of the Battlefields Park are developed in the best interest of Canadians and that the image of the Government of Canada is strengthened without compromising the historic character of the site. To achieve that goal, the Commission will acquire, preserve and develop the great historic battlefields in Quebec. In addition to Internal Services, the Commission has two program activities: « Conservation and Development » and « Public Education and Services ».

This quarterly financial report:

- should be read in conjunction with the *2016-2017 Main Estimates*;
- has been prepared by management of the Commission as required by section 65.1 of the *Financial Administration Act* and in the form and manner prescribed by the Treasury Board;
- has not been subject to an external audit or review.

Basis of Presentation

This quarterly report has been prepared by management using an expenditure basis of accounting. The accompanying Statement of Authorities includes the Commission's spending authorities granted by Parliament and used by the Commission consistent with the *Main Estimates* for the 2016-2017 fiscal year. This quarterly report has been prepared using a special purpose financial reporting framework designed to meet financial information needs with respect to the use of spending authorities.

The authority of Parliament is required before moneys can be spent by the Government. Approvals are given in the form of annually approved limits through appropriation acts or through legislation in the form of statutory spending authority for specific purposes.


When Parliament is dissolved for the purposes of a general election, section 30 of the *Financial Administration Act* authorizes the Governor General, under certain conditions, to issue a special warrant authorizing the Government to withdraw funds from the Consolidated Revenue Fund. A special warrant is deemed to be an appropriation for the fiscal year in which it is issued.

The Commission uses the full accrual method of accounting to prepare and present its annual departmental financial statements that are part of the departmental performance reporting process. However, the spending authorities voted by Parliament remain on an expenditure basis.

Highlights of fiscal quarter and fiscal year to date (YTD) results

This section highlights the significant items that contributed to the net decrease in resources available for the year and the net decrease in actual expenditures for the quarter ended December 31, 2016.

Graph 1 outlines the budgetary authorities which represent the resources available for use for the year as of December 31.

Authorities' analysis

As at December 31, 2016, total authorities available for the year were down by \$4.38 million from the same quarter of the prior year, from \$13.57 million to \$9.19 million. This decrease was due to a drop in the operating budget of \$4.39 million and an increase of the employee benefit plan (EBP) of \$0.01 million. The variation in the operating budget of \$4.39 million comes from the completion of the multi-purpose interpretive trail (Plains of Abraham Trail) parallel to Gilmour hill, a decrease in the operating budget carry forward of \$59,057 (\$537,975 - \$597,032) and a reduction of \$41,000 for expenses in advertising.

Budgetary expenditures analysis

Compared to the previous year, total budgetary expenditures recorded at the end of the quarter, ending December 31, 2016 decreased from \$9.82 million to \$6.05 million as per the Table of departmental budgetary expenditures by Standard Object. This \$3.77 million decrease represents a drop of 38% and is the result of some unfavourable variances of the last three quarters.

The most significant decrease was in *Acquisition of land, buildings and works* (\$3,027,840) due to higher expenses in the first three quarters of 2015-2016 for the redevelopment of Gilmour Hill and the creation of the multi-purpose interpretive trail (Plains of Abraham Trail).

Furthermore, there was a decrease in the standard object of *Other subsidies and payments* (\$755,965), which includes the Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT), since Public Services and Procurement Canada (PSPC) proceeded with a reconciliation of the PILT between the calendar and the fiscal year.

Risks and Uncertainties

This Departmental Quarterly Financial Report reflects the results of the current fiscal period in relation to the *Main Estimates* for which full supply was released on June 23, 2016.

The main risk for the Commission was that it would not meet its target of \$1.85 million in revenues. At the end of this quarter, the Commission is able to confirm that it will be met.

Significant changes in relation to operations, personnel and programs

During the period covered by this report, Ms. Michèle Gagné was appointed as Secretary of the Commission.

In the 2016–2017 fiscal year, a number of infrastructure repair projects have been carried out, given that approximately \$1,200,000 was freed up partly due to the reconciliation of the PILT. Monitoring of the actual expenditures was done rigorously and will be until March 31 to ensure that these projects do not exceed their allocated budgets. The Commission will continue to proactively manage all the sectors' operating budgets by making decisions as the year progresses to ensure that it keeps within the overall budget. This flexibility, during the 2016–2017 fiscal year, was very helpful in improving the Commission's infrastructure. Following the 2016 budget, the Commission's budget was reduced by \$ 41,000 for expenses in advertising.

In January 2016, the City of Québec conducted a new property assessment of land and buildings, which should correspond to an increase of around 20% of the property value, resulting in an increment in the amount payable in 2017-2018 of PILT of approximately \$300,000 representing a 15% augmentation. This increase could affect the amounts the Commission can allocate to infrastructure repairs and other investment projects in 2017–2018 and subsequent years. The Commission will need to draw from its own operating budget to realize some investment projects starting in 2017-2018, for example, the renewal of the car fleet, leaving no room for any unexpected expenses that may arise during the fiscal year, and thus putting at risk the financial stability of the Commission. The Commission will raise the issue with the Department of Canadian Heritage and work on finding solutions.
